

They have also launched a new range called Trashy Ad Bags that are made from discarded advertising billboards around Ghana.

Kwesi Owusu, Ph.D. (Festival Co-Director)

Kwesi Owusu is one of Ghana's leading filmmakers and communications specialists. His film credits include Ama (35 mm, Channel 4 TV/Artificial Eye Distributors, 1991), Ouaga, Africa Cinema Now (16 mm, Channel 4 TV, 1986), Water is Life (Creative Storm 2004), and The Lights Have Gone Out Again (Creative Storm 2009). Dr. Owusu was festival director for the major African Film Festival at the Edinburgh Film House in 1995. He was educated at Adisadel College and London School of Economics. He is an associate of Cambridge University and known expert on African film and culture. He is the author of four books on culture published by Routledge International and heads Creative Storm. He was nominated Personality of the Century by the Millennium Excellence Awards in 2006 and won the Critics and Reviewer's award for Cultural Ambassador 2008. He was recently elected President of Africa Festivals Network.

Claudia D'Andrea is a natural resource specialist. She has a doctorate from University of California, Berkeley, a master's degree from the Johns Hopkins University School of Advanced International Studies (SAIS) in International Relations and International Economics, and a bachelor's degree from Stanford University in Human Biology. She worked for almost twenty years in South and Southeast Asia on natural resource projects for a variety of organizations including the Ford Foundation. She is the co-author of Tropical Forests and the Human Spirit (UC Press, 2002).
